Long Range Planning Committee:

HPCA's Long Range Planning Committee met with State Highway Administration ("SHA") staff Kellie Boulware and her colleagues at the Loveless Civic Center on Thursday, October 12th at 6:30 PM for an update on SHA's 261 project. SHA is conducting a six-month study of MD 261/Walnut Ave. safety and improvement options, including: rumble strips, improved signage and crosswalks; traffic calming approaches such as raised crosswalks and road redesign; and the addition of pedestrian and cyclist paths. SHA will also consider whether to limit thru truck traffic. Stay tuned for results of the SHA study in February 2024. The SHA presentation appears at the end of this newsletter.

The September newsletter announced that that the Anne Arundel County Commission voted on the appointment of Rich Erickson to the Region 9 Stake Holder Advisory Committee ("SAC"). The first Region 9 SAC meeting was held October 14, 2023. The agenda for the kickoff meeting can be found at https://www.aacounty.org/regions-1-3-9-stakeholder-advisory-committee-kickoff-meeting.

The Anne Arundel County Region Plans are community-driven land use documents that build on the work of Plan2040—the Countywide General Development Plan—in smaller areas. The Region Plans evaluate community assets and needs, present a shared vision for the next 20 years, and make specific recommendations about planned land use, zoning, environmental protection, transportation improvements, public facilities, and community design. The Region Plans will be used as a reference for informing future requests that directly affect our Holland Point neighborhood in areas such as modifying zoning, private development plans, and the capital budget and improvement program. The Anne Arundel County Zoning Change Request period for Region 9 runs from October 3 to November 20, 2023 (11:59PM). Property owners and their authorized agents have the opportunity to submit an application to change the zoning for property they own in Region 9 as part of the Comprehensive Zoning process. Holland Point and Rose Haven are largely zoned R5 – Residential: generally intended for low-medium density single-family detached residential development at an urban density of five dwelling units per acre; minimum lot size of 7,000 square feet; maximum lot coverage by structures of 40%; and maximum height of 35 feet.

 Investigate sight distance at Lake Shore Drive (MD 261) and Alabama Avenue






